The Museum has many collections including the McMillan African Art Collection featuring animal statues and masks. This photo shows an antelope mask from the Bobo Tribe in Burkina Faso. The Bobo people make lots of animal masks and believe that animal spirits such as the warthog, antelope, hawk, and serpent are present in the masks.

This carved mask shows curved horns, small ears and a snout decorated with red, black, and white pigments. These masks are worn during ceremonies related to crops and farming.

Family Activities

Animal Art Project: Create your own set of animals using household items.

You will need: Paper plates (2 per animal)
Craft sticks, toothpicks and/or yarn
Construction or scrapbook paper
Markers/Crayons/Colored Pencils
Scissors
Glue Stick/Liquid Glue/Tape

Instructions:

1. Use 1-2 paper plates to cut out the head and body of each animal.
2. Connect the head and body. Depending on your animal use paper to create a neck.
Example: a giraffe needs a long neck; a elephant doesn't need a neck.
3. Use the tape or liquid glue to adhere the craft sticks, toothpicks, or yarn to the body to create the legs of the animal. The number of legs will depend on the animal.
4. Cut out small pieces of paper to decorate the head and body. Glue them down.
5. Cut out your animal's features from the paper or yarn. Make eyes, a nose, horns, or a tail. Glue them down to the head or body.
