


What a year 2025 has been at The Lewis! A year of reflection, expansion and celebration, after all, it was our 20th anniversary. The year saw the opening of three new exhibits, including one new installation in our permanent history gallery --Lynching in Maryland is a moving tribute to the 38 known victims of lynching in our state. iWitness Media & the Movement tells the story of the 1964 passage of the civil rights act and the role of Maryland's media. We also celebrated our namesake, Mr. Reginald F. Lewis, through a museum-curated exhibit, TITAN: The Legacy of Reginald F. Lewis. These exhibits, along with community days and public programs like our Fiberations: The Evolution & Tradition of African American Fiber Aesthetics Colloquium, HBCU Day, MLK 2025 and our Juneteenth celebration, have allowed us to see admissions nearly double since the same time last year.

This year's Juneteenth celebrated the emancipation of those enslaved in Galveston, Texas, who learned of their freedom, one and a half years after emancipation, but also celebrated 20 years of The Lewis being a space for people to learn about the story of African Americans' journey in this state we call home – Maryland! 20 years after cutting the ribbon in 2005, The Lewis continues to educate, entertain, and enlighten those who come through our doors.

We refreshed our logo and brand strategy, fully integrating social media with traditional media, expanding our follower base and diversifying our audience. We have taken seriously our role as a cultural landmark by highlighting artists who have provided beautiful artwork that uses our stunning architecture as a canvas. We hope you've had a chance to view this artwork as you travelled in Baltimore near Pratt and President Streets.

In 2025, we planted the seeds for a more child-friendly museum experience, with the planning of a new children-centric space opening to the public in early 2026! The Lewis is on a roll. It has been a monumental year, allowing us to look back over 20 years of service and forward to 20 more years of history, art, culture and storytelling.


THE SUCCESS OF THE 20TH






iWITNESS: MEDIA & THE MOVEMENT

Presented during the Governor's declaration of 2024 as the Year of Civil Rights in Maryland, *iWitness: Media & The Movement* explores the powerful connection between journalism, storytelling, and social change. This thought-provoking exhibition examines how media has shaped and continues to shape the fight for justice, equity, and truth. Featuring photographs, interviews, and digital narratives, *iWitness* highlights the voices of those who risked their safety to document pivotal moments in the civil rights movement and draws connections to present-day activism. Through this lens, visitors are encouraged to consider how the power of the media can both challenge and transform society.



Created in memory of our museum's visionary namesake, *TITAN: The Legacy of Reginald F. Lewis* honors the extraordinary life, leadership, and lasting influence of one of Maryland's greatest trailblazers. Presented in celebration of the museum's 20th anniversary, this landmark exhibition reflects on Lewis's journey from Baltimore to Wall Street and beyond, tracing his remarkable accomplishments as a businessman, philanthropist, and advocate for Black excellence. Through rare artifacts, archival materials, and powerful storytelling, TITAN invites visitors to reflect on the enduring impact of Lewis's legacy and the inspiration he continues to provide for generations to come.



In collaboration with The Maryland Lynching Memorial Project, we opened with solemn reflection, a new permanent installation, *Lynching in Maryland*. The Lynching in Maryland installation seeks to honor the victims of the 38 documented racial, terror lynchings that occurred in the state between 1854 and 1933. The installation designed by Quatrefoil Associates, serves as a solemn reminder of the atrocities committed, while also educating the public about the lasting impact of racial terror on African Americans and their communities.





...initially clashed, they grew close. Linwood admired Reginald's visionary mindset and drive, fostering a friendship that sharpened them both. To nurture his growing curiosity, Reginald regularly read newspapers like The Wall Street Journal to stay informed.

His football dreams were cut short by a lingering shoulder injury, made worse by competing with stronger athletes. After being benched,

“The Maryland Lynching Memorial Project was honored to work with the Lewis Museum to create the vitally important exhibit, *Lynching In Maryland*. Racial terror lynching claimed the lives of more than 6,500 Black men, women and children in this country. No fewer than 38 of these murders were committed in Maryland. Often overlooked, this dark history must be confronted and acknowledged if we are to achieve a more just society.

Lynching In Maryland provides insight into the history and consequences of racial terror in Maryland and also demonstrates how white supremacy, which fuels racial terror, continues to function. This is a sacred history. 

KING DAY 2025

KING DAY 2025, was a day of reflection, purpose, and creative maladjustment, inspired by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s 1967 call to resist injustice. The museum featured a panel moderated by Dr. Ida Jones with leaders in history, activism, and mental health; a dance performance by Full Circle Dance Company; workshops; and "protest affirmations" led by artist, Sallah Jenkins. Guests also accessed community resources, including voter registration and mental health support.

HBCU DAY 2025



The Lewis Museum hosted a day on the yard, featuring HBCU roundtable discussions, step show performances, family activities, and resource tables. Alumni led powerful conversations on activism and civic engagement, followed by an HBCU happy hour with music by DJ No ID. Inspired by iWitness: Media & the Movement and the Malcolm Bernard HBCU College Fair, the event was created to celebrate HBCU culture, history, and legacy while inspiring future generations to explore the academic excellence and community pride rooted in these institutions.



The annual High School Juried Art Show (HSJAS) celebrated the artistic talent of Maryland youth from all 24 school districts. Supported by the Maryland State Education Association (MSEA), the exhibition showcased the creativity and vision of students in grades 10–12, with participants, families, and educators recognized at the opening reception.



The Lewis museum celebrated 20 years of honoring African American history and culture with an evening of elegance and legacy at the reimagined M&T Bank Exchange. Guests enjoyed live performances, fine cuisine, and heartfelt tributes reflecting on the Museum's past and bright future. The night honored Loida N. Lewis and P. David Bramble with The Titan Award, Dr. Leslie King Hammond and Mayor Brandon M. Scott with The Trailblazer Award, and Gary Bowden with The Maverick Award.



This past Juneteenth, The Lewis museum celebrated Black brilliance, resilience, and creativity with a free community day of performances, conversations, art, food, and joy. AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY TEACHER INSTITUTE | The Lewis museum has expanded teacher programming to include a Summer Teacher Institute. The Institute deepened educators’ understanding of the Civil Rights Movement and its Maryland leaders, including Baltimore CORE chairman, Walter P. Carter—often called the “Martin Luther King of Maryland.” Featuring national speakers, Dr. Lisa Delpit and Dr. Hasan Kwame Jeffries, the program engaged 30 participants who earned up to 2–3 MSDE credits, received an \$800 stipend, and a resource backpack. Housing accommodations were provided for eligible long distance participants. Open to Maryland K–12 educators, the program included expert-led sessions, site visits, and collaborative learning experiences that explored Maryland’s Civil Rights history, effective teaching practices, and classroom resource development. The museum launched a new program in 2025 involving moderated conversations with prominent, high profile, guest speakers, artists and scholars who are renowned for their achievements in their industries, community or fields of study.


