The Lewis Museum Opens New KidZone Exhibit, Lifting as We Climb, During King Day Weekend with Youth-Led Ribbon Cutting and New Community Mural

Baltimore, MD — Saturday, January 17 at 10:00 a.m. — The Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African American History & Culture will celebrate the opening of its **new permanent children’s exhibition, KidZone: Lifting as We Climb, with a special ribbon-cutting ceremony on Saturday, January 17 at 10:00 a.m.**

The ceremony will feature **Mayor Brandon M. Scott and the First Family of Baltimore, alongside the great-nieces of Reginald F. Lewis, Paige Fugett (11) and Natalie Fugett (8), and Avery Turner (9), the museum’s inaugural KidZone Kid Curator. Lance Harris Jr. (6), the young star of the family social media series Snacks with LJ,** will also help cut the ribbon. Together, these young leaders represent the next generation of youth creators and leaders, reflecting the spirit of KidZone and the museum’s commitment to centering children’s voices, creativity, and potential.

Avery has been involved in shaping KidZone since its earliest stages, offering ideas and creative direction to ensure the space reflects how children learn, play, and imagine. “I wanted the KidZone to be really colorful and fun,” said Avery Turner, KidZone Kid Curator. “At the beginning, I drew a picture to show them what kids would like. I can’t wait to see my picture in real life!”

“KidZone represents our commitment to centering children as learners, creators, and leaders,” said Terri Lee Freeman, President of the Lewis Museum. “By inviting young people into Maryland’s Black history through joy, creativity, and hands-on discovery, we are planting seeds of pride, confidence, and possibility that will grow for generations.”

About KidZone: Lifting as We Climb

Guided by the spirit of “Lifting as We Climb,” KidZone introduces young visitors to Maryland’s Black history, art, and culture through hands-on discovery and play. Designed for ages 6–13, with select activities for younger children, the exhibit is organized around three core themes: activism, creating, and community.

Interactive elements such as lift-and-drop panels, spin discs, sliders, and creative stations allow children to explore stories of art, dance, music, and objects from the museum’s collection. A large illustrated Maryland map highlights Black people, places, and contributions from across the state, while a cozy reading tent offers a quiet space for reflection.

New Community Mural: The Children Shall Lead

In celebration of the KidZone opening, the museum will also unveil a new President Street community art mural titled **The Children Shall Lead, created by Baltimore-based digital artist Jordan Lawson.**

The artwork is inspired by the belief that children are not only the future, but active leaders shaping what comes next. Lawson began the creative process by asking a simple but powerful question: “What do you want to be when you grow up?” He posed this question to his godchildren and nephews, using their answers and likenesses as the foundation for the piece. Each child in the mural is illustrated wearing the uniform of the profession they envision—a race car driver, football player, doctor, and firefighter—symbolizing ambition, service, discipline, care, courage, and leadership. The children face forward toward the horizon, representing vision, direction, and possibility. Behind them, a city, hospital, fire station, racetrack, and stadium subtly emerge, reinforcing the idea that the future is still being built and that children are central to shaping it.

The mural is designed to feel hopeful, empowering, and intentional, honoring children’s dreams and their power to lead with imagination, purpose, and heart.

The public opening of KidZone will take place during the museum’s annual King Day Celebration, a day dedicated to honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.’s legacy through the voices, creativity, and leadership of young people. This year’s theme centers on youth activism, from the children who marched and protested during the Civil Rights Movement to the young organizers and changemakers leading today’s social justice movements.

Families will be invited to experience KidZone as part of a living tribute to Dr. King’s belief that young people are essential to creating change. Through hands-on activities, performances, film screenings, STEAM and robotics, crafts, and interactive dialogue, children will explore how courage, creativity, and community can shape a more just future, just as they do inside the KidZone exhibit.
