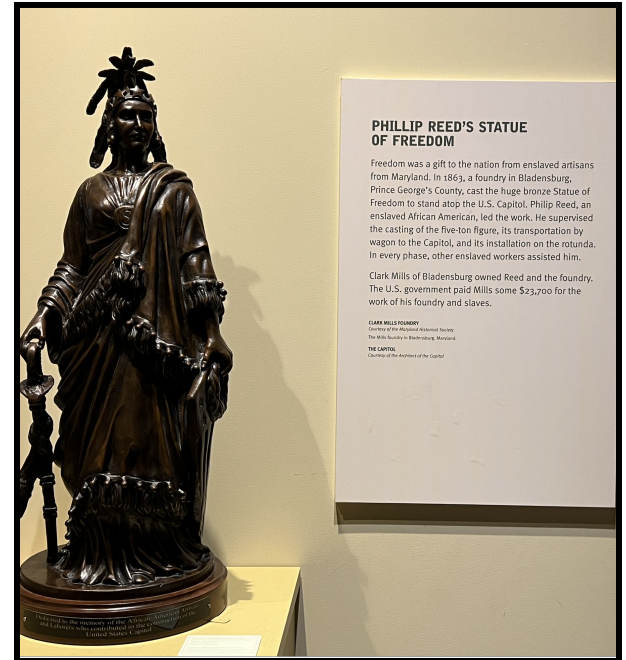


# Humanizing Black Labor: Re-storying the Black Labor Experience in Maryland

Re-storying the labor experience of African Americans in Maryland, as exhibited through the Reginald F. Lewis Museum, intends to highlight the historical dehumanization of persons of African descent in Maryland beginning with the enslavement of Africans to the present. This theme aims to humanize the black labor experience, inform on the national economic and political contributions of the Black labor experience, and provide a multilayered perspective on the Black labor experience from slavery to the present.
